Moderator's Musings:

Greetings from frigid South Dakota.

First, I want to be sure all Presbytery Moderators are aware there will be a Zoom Moderator's Conference Feb. 16 3 p.m. CT and 2 p.m. MT. This will be a 90 minute structured conversation. If you haven't received the emailed flyer, please contact Lana or I.

Second, just a reminder that there are two more Zoom treasurer trainings Feb. 4 at 3 p.m. CT [2 p.m. MT] and Feb. 7 at 2 p.m. CT [1 p.m. MT]. These cover the same information, so you need only attend one. These sessions are for all treasurers at all levels and everyone who may ever consider being a treasurer or anyone who wants to know what our treasurers are doing and why. So basically, everyone in the Synod! Again, if you didn't get the emailed flyer, contact Lana or I.

Our leadership at the national level are listening to the concerns from PW groups and are responding with these kinds of resources, so let's utilize them to create a stronger PW.

Next I want to encourage you all to be involved in your Presbytery meetings. Many of the overtures and resolutions passed by the General Assembly are coming to your Presbyteries to be voted on very soon. Read up on them and join the discussion.

Some excellent books I read this year that pertain to some of these issues are:

- Trust Women by the Rev. Rebecca Todd Peters, a Presbyterian minister
- The Turnaway Study by Dr. Diana Greene Foster
- Unclobber by Colby Martin, published by the Westminster John Knox Press
- No Justice for Agnes by Wayne Fanebust
- Understanding Poverty by Dr. Ruby K. Payne

The first two address women's autonomy and reproductive rights.

The third one is a guide to rethinking our misuse of the Bible on homosexuality.

No Justice is based on historical events in South Dakota and deal with wealth and justice.

The last one was written in 1996 but was revised in 2005. It is an eye-opener. Who knew there were hidden rules we all follow, whether we live in poverty, are middle class, or wealthy?

I am looking forward to reading the book, *What Kind of Christianity* by Dr. William Yoo and attending the Webinar that has been arranged as part of the Justice & Peace Book Study, Feb. 13 at 5:30 p.m. CT [4:30 p.m. MT]. Dr. Yoo looks at the devastating history of self-interested and self-justifying white Presbyterians using their wealth,

intellect, and even Scripture itself to defend slavery and define Black persons as racially inferior. So maybe saying 'looking forward to reading' is not accurate because I'm sure this will be a hard read, but so necessary if we are to

move forward as a denomination. Please read and use the Litany of Repentance that came out of the General Assembly. The first step to healing is to recognize the hurt and ask for forgiveness.

Winter is the perfect season to stay indoors with a good book and a cuppa. A cat on the lap is nice, too. God bless each of you.

Together in Service, formerly known as Mission Opportunities, is one way that Presbyterian Women support mission. In addition to undertaking self-selected mission projects, we can also be "Together in Service" through financial gifts. The generous giving of Presbyterian Women to Together in Service funds mission initiatives such as health care, education, reconciliation and healing, poverty relief and more, as well as support for existing denominational and ecumenical programs.

Presbyterian Women answer the call to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world. Whether it's by picking up knitting needles to create a blanket for a child in need or picking up a crowbar to participate

in disaster recovery work, Presbyterian Women get to work when there's a need.

Presbyterian Women also offer ongoing support to local church or community projects, committing to answering short-term needs in their communities, or providing goods, labor, or financial support for Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) mission work.

Your Together in Service Team, Janine Brandt, Audrey Fenton and Pat McKisson, are identifying missions we would like to see your P.W. groups embrace plus adding other suggestions on how to be Christ's hands and feet in our communities and around the world.

For 2023, our main focus for missions will be:

- 1. Native American Relationships/Partnering with the Dakota Presbytery
- 2. Bullying Blue Hat Initiative

- 3. Prescription Bottle collection for Matthew 25 Ministries
- 4. Gifts of the Heart kits.
- 5. Church World Service kits.
- 6. Hands on knitting/crocheting missions for women who may not be able to get out for other projects but are able to do this type of project at home.

Our committee is developing a 'Together in Service Book of Projects' Native American partnership opportunities, mission ideas and other suggestions. It is being sent to all the Presbytery Moderators within the Synod of Lakes and Prairies. They in turn will forward it on to all church P.W. Moderators within their presbytery.

Our hopes are that this book will give everyone a reference to Together in Service projects that are already being supported and additionally we hope to give someone a chance to embrace a new mission that speaks to them. Everyone is urged to review the booklet and send any mission ideas to Pat McKisson (e-mail pmac0247@gmail.com) that your churches have and would like to share. These can be added to the document as it is updated.

The Together in Service committee looks forward to developing and sharing resources with all of the P.W. groups within our presbyteries.

- Push for stronger laws.

- Support women's leadership.
- Build solidarity with other movements."

Magdalene Lewis offers this prayer: "God of love, we give thanks for the signs of determined life and hope among us, even if they sometimes feel tiny and overshadowed by forces that seem so strong and dominating. We pray for lifegiving power that we receive from you. We pray for all people who work courageously to end gender-based violence. 

- We organize national and regional events that offer young women leadership training and opportunities for networking with peers and mentors.

The meaning of the pin/pendant: The caring, supportive hands represent women who seek to build an inclusive community of Presbyterian Women. The leaf represents growth of our personal and corporate response to Jesus Christ as we nurture our faith. The dove indicates our work for peace in our own lives and throughout the world, shown in the globe. At the center of the design is the cross, by which our sins are forgiven and we are freed to live in Christ who is at the center of our lives. The overall design is of a butterfly, a symbol of newness in Christ.

In my church, the moderator decided that ALL women are faithful in their service to PW and to the PC(USA) and so all women were given a silver pin/pendant. Leadership Development Grant Development received the money and grants were distributed. It's a win-win!!

Beverly Larson-Needham, an organ transplant recipient, will be our speaker on the organ donor program.


The moderator has received annual reports for 2022 from five churches. Activities included: a Holiday Fair, donations to food pantries, making fleece blankets and tied quilts, donating school supplies, a "Pie a la Mode" stand for RAGBRAI, making bags for Sunday School children, Trunkor-Treat events, ice cream social, chili supper, Christmas stockings, grab-and-go meals, crocheting plarn mats, and elderly/nursing home visits.

HOMESTEAD GATHERING:

We were blessed to have received over \$3,000 for our Synod Gathering offering. This money was divided 1/2 to the Susan LaFlesche Picotte Center and 1/2 to Marion Medical Mission.

The money received by Marion Medical Mission was able to provide 4 wells. 3 wells are in Tanzania and one was in Zambia.

Over 415 people will be served by our 4 wells. Your generosity will bless these folks for years to come.



The Well Program not only provides safe drinkingwater, butalso the necessary knowledge, skills, and tools to manage and maintain the protected water source, so that safe drinking water continues in future years. Where wells have been built, waterborne diseases are eliminated.

Sub-saharan Africa has the highest under 5 mortality rate in the world. Safe drinking water means the difference between life and death.

PERIOD PACK: MENSTRUAL HYGIENE KIT

NEW FOR 2023! In many parts of the world, women and girls live in period poverty – lacking access to necessary feminine care supplies. During the menstrual cycle, these hygiene materials are especially important to healthy practices. Not having supplies like sanitary napkins, tampons, soap and disposable plastic bags can create challenges that lead to unsafe and unsanitary conditions.

Now you can help women and girls around the world living in period poverty. The CWS Period Pack gives women and girls the essentials they need to feel clean, be healthy and live with dignity during the menstrual cycle.

SUPPLIES NEEDED:

- One 1-gallon Ziploc bag
- Two 2 oz bottle hand sanitizer
- Three 4-gallon bathroom trash bags
- One travel pack of Wet Ones
- Ten unscented tampons (5 regular, 5 super absorbency.)
- Ten unscented sanitary napkins (Long super ultra-thin.)
- One bath-size bar of soap in the original package (3 oz bar or larger. No lvory or Jergen's soap.)
- One pack of flushable wipes (Unscented, 42 count.)
- Six laundry detergent sheets (place sheets in small Ziploc bag.)

ASSEMBLY TIPS

- Place all items in the plastic bag, remove air, and seal.
- All items must be new.
- Do not enclose personal notes, money, or extra items in the kits.



PW NATIVE AMERICAN BOOK STUDY

Join us virtually as we grow through our book discussions to learn more about racial injustices and increase our understanding of Native American/Indigenous Peoples' traditions, customs, and historical trauma. We hope this leads to becoming better equipped to build relationships.

February 6 (1:30 PM or 6:30 PM sessions) and February 20 (1:30 PM session) The Dull Knifes of Pine Ridge: A Lakota Odyssey by Joe Starita

Synopsis: Joe Starita tells the triumphant and moving story of a Lakota-Northern Cheyenne family. In 1878, the renowned Chief Dull Knife, who fought alongside Crazy Horse, escaped from forced relocation in Indian Territory and led followers on a desperate six-hundred-mile freedom flight back to their homeland. His son, George Dull Knife survived the Wounded Knee Massacre and later toured in Buffalo Bill Cody's Wild West Show. Guy Dull Knife Sr.

fought in World War I and took part in the Siege of Wounded Knee in 1973. Guy Dull Knife Jr. fought in Vietnam and is now an accomplished artist.
